1 Notice and Quorum

Ian Swales welcomed members to the formal Annual General Meeting of the North East Process Industry Cluster and confirmed appropriate notice of the meeting had been given. Quorum for the meeting was 10% of the current membership of 331. 29 proxies had been received and with approximately 40 members attending in person then quorum had been comfortably reached.



2 Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Minutes had been circulated for the previous AGM held on 16 December 2015 and the meeting agreed them as a true record. Ian Swales told the meeting that following the increase in membership fees agreed at the last AGM a few members failed to renew but they had been effectively been replaced during the year. Ian Swales went on to thank the members for their loyalty and support.

lan Swales told the members that an additional board member from the commodities end of the sector might be sought.

4 Director's Interests in Securities

The directors had no financial interest in NEPIC.

5 Chairman's Review

lan Swales told the meeting that his first year in office had been interesting, particularly in the political arena. It had been a successful year for NEPIC with many successful events, new public projects being signed off and financial stability continuing. Ian Swales went on to say he had been particularly impressed by recent Phama events and the bio resources conference.

Strategy – Ian Swales confirmed that the strategy of NEPIC had not changed and briefly reminded the meeting of the key points. Stan Higgins told the meeting that the annual report which had already been distributed to the members included KPIs which address these strategic areas so that progress could be measured. Stan Higgins went on to say that some measures were inevitably subjective however the key goal was the growth of the sector. To date on public projects NEPIC had been involved in bringing 83 investments to the region and had helped create 5,000 jobs with a GVA of £3.5bn. Ian Swales went on to pay tribute to the work undertaken by Stan Higgins and his team.



MPs Dinner – Ian Swales told the meeting that 6 MPs attended including Andrew Percy the Northern Powerhouse minister plus the peer Ian Wrigglesworth. The meeting was well attended by industry and there was some very constructive discussion. Rishi Sunak told the meeting of his excitement at the opportunities created by Brexit and other topics covered included the government's industrial strategy, skills and apprenticeships, clean coal, the Tees Estuary Partnership and the Tees Valley Process Industry report.

Tees Valley Process Industry – John Brady reminded the meeting that the TVPI report was a high level analysis of the Tees Valley process industry which had been completed with the help of MPI, Jacobs, TVU and 46 local companies. The report demonstrated clear opportunities for this region and other regions but also that completion from Europe and further afield was strong. John Brady went on to say that the CGP was supportive of the study and he was meeting them next week to discuss extending the study to other regions.

John Brady went on to tell the meeting that in the Tees Valley 150 potential symbiotic relationships had been identified together with 12 potential projects which would involve major investment. Actions to progress the latter had been included in the next round of Local Growth Fund applications.

Brexit – Ian Swales told the meeting that he had attended several events dealing with Brexit in the last few weeks and had been left with the view that the complexity of the process might make a soft Brexit unlikely. Members would therefore be well advised to try and have contingency plans for all potential outcomes. Ian Swales went on to say that there could be positive impacts of Brexit, for example a new study is looking at the opportunities of creating free ports in the UK and Teesport would be well placed for this. Ian Swales was not aware of any studies which specifically looked at the region in relation to Brexit.

Stan Higgins told the meeting that in relation to NEPIC their European funded projects should be ok until 2019 and then it was hoped that national government would pick up this sort of intervention. If the UK were excluded from European consortia then potentially valuable opportunities for learning would however be lost.

Future Leadership – Ian Swales told the meeting that Stan Higgins planned to retire during 2017 and placed on record the thanks of the directors and members for his enormous contribution to NEPIC over the years. The board of NEPIC intend to carry on his good work into the future and a recruitment process for a new CEO will start early in the New Year.



8 Company Accounts

Michael Moran from NEPICs auditors Robson Laidler took the meeting through the profit and loss account to 31st March 2016 and the balance sheet at that date.

The Members then approved the following resolutions:

'To receive and adopt the company's annual accounts for the financial year ended March 2016 together with the director's report and auditor's report on those accounts.'

'To appoint Robson Laidler, Jesmond, Newcastle upon Tyne NE2 1TJ as the Company's auditors to hold office for the conclusion of the meeting to the end of the next period for appointing auditors under section 485 (2) of the Companies Act 2006 at a remuneration to be determined by the directors.'
